Dear Amazing Grace,

At a recent planning meeting for this Summer's ELCA Youth Gathering, President of our congregation, Wendy Hoffman, shared a quote from Brene Brown about the difference between "fitting in" and "belonging":

"Fitting in is becoming who you think you need to be in order to be accepted. Belonging is being your authentic self and knowing that no matter what happens, you belong to you."

This distinction rings so true to me and has been on my mind a lot lately. I have certainly known the difference between changing who I am so that I can try to fit in with people around me and being offered unequivocal belonging just as I am.

Our conversation at the Youth Gathering meeting brought me back to the first day of eighth grade, starting at a new school. Growing up, my family moved quite frequently so starting at a new school was a familiar experience by the time I was in the last year of middle

school. However, this move proved to be more difficult for me than most, almost certainly because of the internal and external changes that adolescence was bringing about in me.

I remember on that first day I could not bring myself to talk to anyone. I just wanted to hide away. By the time lunch rolled around, I had managed to avoid most people. I'd planned to sit on my own in the lunchroom and NOT eat my packed lunch. God forbid anyone see how weird I look while I eat! The horror! But when I got to the cafeteria, to my surprise I was approached by another student, Tim Graham. Tim came up to me and said, "Nice name." He then invited me to sit with him and his friends. I did. And I ate. And I was the butt of no one's jokes. Slowly, over the course of months, I became more and more relaxed with this group of friends. It took time and persistence and that necessary first step of offering me a place at the table, but eventually I came to see that Tim and his friends extended to me a real sense of belonging. I thought I would have to change my behavior in radical ways (like not eating) in order to be accepted by my new classmates. But Tim and time showed me that I could be accepted for who I am. I could know real belonging.

The readings for the season of Easter this year (3/31-5/12) all invite us to reflect on belonging. We will hear that

A Look at the February SPAS Conference

In late February, Pastor Tim Maybee, Annie and Mark Morgan, and Cyndi Berg attended the Saint Paul Area Synod (SPAS) Conference Assemblies and Tool Kit for Congregational Leaders at Faith Lutheran in Forest Lake.

At its best, faith is meant to draw us out of isolation. Above all, that's what the Conference Assemblies and Tool Kit for Congregational Leaders aims to do. This is one of those special events in the life of the church that reminds us that we are more than the sum of our parts and that we are connected to a wide web of God's faithful people, all of whom are striving to help the church remain faithful to God's mission of love for the world.

The Conference Assemblies give the church a chance to make prayerful decisions to shape the future of how we engage in God's mission. This year, each regional conference elected individuals to positions of leadership in our Synod and decided on whom to send to the next all-ELCA Churchwide Assembly in 2025. We also passed two resolutions and a memorial. The resolutions will now be voted on by the whole Synod at our Assembly in May and the memorial will be considered at the Churchwide Assembly.

The first resolution is a call to utilize worship-resources in our new hymnal (All Creation Sings) in response to the all-too-common gun violence events in our country. The second formalizes a partnership between the Saint Paul Area Synod and the Minnesota Multifaith Network, a diverse coalition of people of faith. The memorial has to do with building structures of support and accountability for bishops.

The Tool Kit for Congregational Leaders brings together lay leaders, ministry volunteers and church staff from across the synod for series of workshops on a variety of topics related to congregational life. The event provides opportunities to learn from experts as well as hear the experiences and perspectives of others.

From Pastor Tim: In the afternoon, I was privileged to attend a workshop on congregations addressing mental health concerns. Pastor Seth Perry (Elim Lutheran, Scandia) shared his powerful story and gave resources and insight for congregations looking to be more thoughtful in how we address mental health. A sample of his devotional and copies of the bimonthly recovery and wellness newspaper, The Phoenix Spirit, are available for viewing on AGLC's welcome table.

From Cyndi: I attended the Doctrine of Discovery (DOD) session led by Rev. Canon Robert Two Bulls, missioner for the Episcopal Church in Minnesota. The workshop provided an overview of the historical (and religious) roots of the DOD which began in the 1400s giving colonial powers the authority to claim lands and conquer people as long as those people were not Christians. In America, the doctrine was used to allow the appropriation of land from Indigenous people. It is important to gain a deeper understanding of this sad history and the continuing sociopolitical impact and ramifications that it has had on Native Peoples as well as learn about ways in which we can work together to acknowledge this history and respond in helpful, productive ways.

My afternoon workshop, led by church building consultant Anne Gerrietts, focused on exploring possibilities for church spaces. We discussed ways in which we can enhance our ministry by ensuring we

are welcoming to all. Additionally, we contemplated how the building needs of a congregation change over time and how this requires that we be open to new or different uses. We were encouraged to consider how our building may be an asset to others based on the needs of the greater community. It was interesting to hear about congregations that have partnered with community theater, artists for gallery space, childcare and senior-care facilities, non-profits organizations, and more.

From Annie and Mark: Mark attended a session on Creation Care. All six of the Minnesota synods have agreed to advocate on matters related to three areas of concerns: hunger, poverty, and care of creation. Continuing to make sure our church building is as efficient as possible is one way we can help. The Toolkit provided new resources and partners that would help us update our evaluation of what is possible: Minify Energy and EnerChange. They offer free assessments, grants and support for making changes in a congregation.

Mark also attended a session on Global Mission Partnerships to learn about the incredible growth in preaching points in Tanzania and improvements in the quality of life. Guatemala remains a mission partner in some SPAS churches.

Annie attended a session by the Center for Leadership and Neighborhood Engagement focused on asset-based approaches for making growth and change. Key themes were about co-creation of solutions and actions (engaging all stakeholders), emphasizing and enhancing what is already good (and building on the good), looking at the "something special" that every person has to share, and ensuring the voice of the "insiders" guide any work rather than having change forced upon anyone by well-intended "outsiders."

Having attended the Synod Assembly for the past couple of years, we find it really rewarding to be a part of the larger church's thinking and planning. We wholeheartedly recommend AGLC folks start thinking now about committing to attend the Toolkit and Synod Assembly next year. We'd love to see that opportunity go to someone new in 2025!

April 28 The Paris Library by Janet Skeslien Charles

This book is based of the true story of the heroic librarians at the American Library in Paris during WWII. It reminds us of the importance of libraries, books and the human connections that can be found in both.

May 19 The Wind Knows My Name by Isabel Allende

The lives of a Jewish boy escaping Nazi-occupied Europe and a mother and daughter fleeing 21st century El Salvador intersect in this novel about war and immigration.

June 23 Leave No Trace by Mindy Mejia

A man and his son go on a camping trip to the Boundary Waters of northern Minnesota. They fail to return and searchers find their camp site ravaged as by a bear. The pair is presumed dead. Ten years later the son reappears. He is violent and uncommunicative. Can anyone reach him and fill in the previous ten years.

July 28 Deacon King Kong by James McBride

In September 1969, a cranky old church deacon known as Sportcoat shuffles into the courtyard of a housing project, pulls a gun from his pocket and in front of all shoots the project's drug dealer at point blank range. The reasons for and the consequences of this act are at the heart of this novel.

August 25 Loyalty by Lisa Scottoline

This book is an emotional, action-packed epic of love and justice set during the rise of the Mafia in Sicily.

September 22 Apples Never Fall by Liane Moriarty a book in the bag selection

If your mother was missing would you tell the police? Even if the most obvious suspect was your father? This is the situation faced by the Delaney children. Two of the children think their father is innocent; while two are not so sure. As the two sides square off against each other, all will begin to reexamine their shared family history.

October 27 The Unsettled by Ayana Mathis

This is a multigenerational novel set in the 1980's in racially and politically turbulent Philadelphia and the tiny town of Bonapart, Alabama about a mother fighting for her sanity and her survival.

November 24 The Secret Book of Flora Lea by Patti Callahan Henry

When a woman stumbles across a mysterious children's book, long-held secrets about her missing sister and their childhood spent in the English countryside during WWII are revealed.
