Dear Amazing Grace,

Where were you born?

My first impulse when I hear this question is to respond with the obvious answer: I was born at Presbyterian Hospital in Albuquerque, New Mexico.

However, as we complete this year's Lenten journey and burst into the season of Easter, another response to that question arises within me: I was also born in the empty tomb of Christ, when he was raised from the dead.

It's a happy coincidence of the English language that the two words, womb

and tomb, rhyme. Faithful Christians throughout the centuries have come to value the imagery of Christ's tomb as the womb from which new life springs forth for the world. That is what Easter is all about: Christ's resurrection and our rebirth into his life.

Rebirth. New life. These images and truths that shape the Christian imagination can sometimes be trivialized as private blessings that remain as ends in themselves. Yet, in the Gospels and the letters of Paul rebirth and new life are not simply meant to be passively received and privately enjoyed. New life is meant to be lived! That is, there is a character to new life—ways in which we might live out our rebirth into Christ.

The late pastor and theologian Daniel Erlander picks up this idea in his playfully illustrated book, Manna and Mercy. In it, he includes the graphic below:


Please bring work gloves and any other supplies or tools you think could be helpful. Light refreshments will be provided. Your help is needed and appreciated.

Christian Faith Reflection

Isaiah 58:6

"Is not this the fast that I choose: to loose the bonds of injustice, to undo the thongs of the yoke, to let the oppressed go free, and to break every yoke?"

As we enter this Lenten season — marked by fasting, reflection, and repentance — we are also called to a deeper reckoning with the injustices that plague our communities. This is not a season of empty rituals, but a time to align ourselves with God's vision for justice. And I yet, as we look around, the forces of oppression seem to be tightening their grip — politicians, at every level, are pushing policies that harm the poor, immigrants, and I children. They seek to defund healthcare, dismantle education, and strip away the resources people need to care for their families. Their choices are not neutral; they are in direct opposition to the call of Christ to love I and serve the most vulnerable. It is easy to feel weary, even hopeless, in the face of such deep-seated injustice.

But Lent reminds us that despair is not our inheritance — resurrection is. The same God who led our ancestors through the wilderness is leading us still. We must not be divided by race, class, or nationality, but **stand firm in faith, integrity, and love.** Now is the time to fight for what we know is right: a world where every child is fed, every family is cared for, and every person is treated with dignity. This season calls us to fast not only from comfort but from complacency. We must press forward, together, knowing that justice is not just a dream — it is the very will of God.

In faith formation this morning we continued talking about and reflecting on lessons from Dietrich Bonhoefer. We talked about turning points in our own lives as well as turning points in Bonhoefer's life. Points that really make a difference, what happens and why it's a turning point. At the table I was at, we talked about how our first job, marriage, children, grandchildren, great grandchildren, divorce, death, changing where you live or work. All these points and more, can have a great impact on our lives. Pastor Tim talked about how Christ exists as community.

The question Pastor Tim left us with as we were ending is—Who is our neighbor? We will be in these discussions throughout the Lenten season. You can come any time! No previous classes are required.

The disciples came to Jesus asking, "Who gets the highest rank in God's kingdom?" For an answer Jesus called over a child, whom he stood in the middle of the room, and said, "I'm telling you, once and for all, that unless you return to square one and start over like children, you're not even going to get a look at the kingdom, let alone get in. Whoever becomes simple and elemental again, like this child, will rank high in God's kingdom. What's more, when you receive the childlike on my account, it's the same as receiving me. Mathew 18:1b-5

A Message of Gratitude from the Saint Paul Area Synod

Thank you for your congregation's faithful and generous sharing of mission support with the synod and churchwide expressions of the ELCA during February 2025. This month, we hear from Rolf Lowenberg-DeBoer, a synod staff member who works extensively with lay leaders.

As Lutherans we take seriously the priesthood of all believers. Each one of us has God-given gifts to offer in service to God and neighbor. Many people across the larger body of Christ take on leadership roles in their congregations as a way to further God's Kingdom.

The Saint Paul Area Synod supports lay leaders and various aspects of lay leadership in a number of ways. One of the main ways we do this is through our annual Tool Kit for Congregational Leaders, which focuses on equipping lay leaders for God's mission in their contexts. Around 240 leaders attended this event last month. There were nine fantastic workshops throughout the day...a wonderful lineup that encouraged, connected, and resourced leaders in congregations across the synod.

This fall, we will hold a six-part cohort series for presidents, vice presidents and other council members. Several former and current council leaders will join me in leading this series. It will be similar to the programming we offered in 2022-2023 with Dr. Dave Webb. Titled "Deeper Dive for Church Councils," the series will focus on many aspects of leading a church council and overall congregational leadership. I spend quite a bit of time walking with councils and executive teams as they seek to engage deeply in God's mission. We work together with the Holy Spirit to find the way forward!

The synod's work groups also seek to equip and accompany congregations. Advocates for Racial Equity (ARE) encourages us all to confront privilege and racism in and around the synod. ARE's recent event in conjunction with the synod's Vitality Team focused on the topic of deep listening and racial justice. Presenter Rachel Svanoe Moynihan led 40 people (mostly lay people) from 13 congregations through a powerful look at racial justice at this time.

Our Care of Creation work group collaborates with the Northeastern Minnesota Synod on news and events around being good stewards of the earth. We are collaborating with the Northwest Synod of Wisconsin to hold the annual <u>EcoFaith Summit</u> in Duluth on April 5. I will be there along with most of our synod work group...consider joining us in person or watch the livestream! Many lay leaders provide content for the monthly *Green Blades Rising* newsletter. This is a mostly lay-led group working to care for God's precious creation across Minnesota and beyond. <u>Read about all of our synod work groups here.</u>

By their nature, call committees are primarily made up of laypeople. The mobility team of the synod (the Bishop and her assistants) accompanies up to 30 call processes each year. In 2024 we installed 15 pastors in congregations. The call process is a great way for lay leaders in congregations to use their gifts for God's mission in their contexts. Each process involves prayer, training, deep discernment, and more. Our role as synod staff is to accompany congregations through each process so that they can find a new pastor or deacon to serve!

There are many other ways that the synod equips and supports lay leaders. The official roles leaders play (like president, vice president, treasurer or secretary) are the more obvious ones, but we occasionally work with outreach teams, social justice groups and worship teams. We also work with emerging leaders as they seek to find out how to best use their gifts in service. As a layperson myself, I am passionate about accompanying other laypeople as they explore ways to serve in their communities!

April 27 The Dictionary of Lost Words by Pip Williams a book bag selection

Esme spends time during her childhood with her father and other lexicographers, who are collecting words for the first Oxford English Dictionary. She finds that many words relating to women and common people are being discarded. She begins collecting these words, continuing as she grows up, creating her own dictionary of lost words.

May 18 The Maid by Nita Prose a book bag selection

An excentric maid discovers a guest dead in his bed in her hotel. She becomes a suspect. This is a Clue like mystery. The story explores what is it like to be just like everyone else and also totally different. Caring for one another is what is important

June 22 Such a Fun Age by Kiley Reid

A young black woman, babysitter for a white family, is accused of kidnapping the toddler in her charge when shopping in a grocery store. A crowd gathers and the action is filmed. The novel watches the drama unfold.

July 27 The River We Remember by William Kent Kruger

It is Memorial Day 1958 in a small town in Minnesota. The body of a wealthy resident is found and suspicion falls on a native American who has recently returned to town with a Japanese wife. Secrets abound in the town. Can the murder be solved before the town explodes.

August 24 Tom Lake by Ann Patchett

In the spring of 2020 Lara's three daughters return home to the family orchard. As they pick cherries the daughters ask their mother for stories of her past. As she tells her stories her daughters examine their own lives and their relationship with their mother. They also reconsider everything they thought they knew.

September 28 A Council of Dolls by Mora Susa Power

The story of three Native American women from three different eras told in part through the stories of the dolls they carry.

October 26 The Last Russian Doll by Kristen Loesch

A story of secrets, revenge and redemption that follows three generations of Russian women from 1917 revolution to the last days of the Soviet Union.

November 26 The Marriage Portrait by Maggie O'Farrel

Historical fiction. Lucrezia de' Medici marries Alfonso II, duke of Ferra. She begins to think her life is in danger, is it? Historically, the answer is yes. The author brings Lucrezia to life.
