Pastor's Column

Dear Amazing Grace,

Last month I had an experience that reminded me that the distinction between sacred and secular is a human-constructed distinction. Or, to put it another way, God to Holy Spirit goes wherever God wants!

Two musical groups that I've enjoyed since high school came to the Twin Cities in April. Both bands are known for critiques of the way that religion is often practiced. Their criticism is mostly fair but can at times verge on the edge of hostility. Many people have been hurt by our humanconstructed religious institutions, so I don't think their critiques are terribly off-base. This is all simply to say that both groups' music is decidedly secular.

While the opening band was in the middle of their set, I took a moment to take in the scene, looking around at the crowd enjoying the music together. Suddenly, I was overwhelmed with a deep sense of connection with my fellow concert goers. For a moment, it was as though we were one. As the band told the truth of a world that can be so harsh, we stood together. This kind of union with one's fellow human beings or fellow members of creation is the kind of experience that mystics describe in moments of spiritual ecstasy with God and their neighbors.

Now, I tell this story not because I believe such an experience is notable in its uniqueness. Rather, my intention here is to draw attention to the truth that God's Spirit is not the property of "the church" or any individual denomination or congregation. God's Spirit is wild and shows up even in the least likely times and places to call us back to the truth of our fundamental connection with God, creation, and our fellow human beings. The sacred and the secular tend to dissolve into one when God is present. Or, maybe it's more accurate to say that the secular is made sacred by God's abiding presence.

This experience has made me wonder, what else do I write off as exclusively secular? Where do I least expect God to show up? Do I assume that God is absent from times and places that do not fit the mold of my previous religious experience? Where

AGLC President Update: May 2025

"He replied, 'You of little faith, why are you so afraid?' Then He got up and rebuked the winds and the waves, and it was completely calm." — **Matthew 8:26**

What is your favorite season? Here in Minnesota, we experience all four—each one bringing change, beauty, and challenges. Winter can feel long, dark, and bitterly cold, but eventually, spring arrives even here in Minnesota. The storms of spring bring rain, washing away the remnants of winter and making way for new life.

Just like the changing seasons, our lives go through seasons as well. Some come and go quickly, while others shake us to our core. These past few years, I have faced some of the hardest storms of my life—having kids grow up and move out, losing family I loved dearly and, most recently, my sweet dog, Tater passed. The grief has been overwhelming at times, and I have found myself asking, "Why?" and "When will this get easier?"

The disciples asked similar questions in the storm. They were terrified, even though Jesus was with them. But when they called out to Him, He calmed the wind and the waves. Sometimes, like the disciples, we focus so much on the storm that we forget who is in the boat with us.

Jesus Himself endured the ultimate storm—betrayal, suffering, and death on the cross. Those who loved Him must have felt hopeless, lost, and full of questions, just as we do in our own losses. But the story didn't end there. On Easter morning, the tomb was empty. The resurrection reminds us that no storm or season lasts forever. There is always renewal, always hope.

My grief still lingers, but I am learning that the depth of my pain is a reflection of the depth of my love. And in my lowest moments, I remember: No matter what storms I face, He is with me, and renewal is coming.

Christ is risen, he is risen indeed. Allelujah!

It is Memorial Day 1958 in a small town in Minnesota. The body of a wealthy resident is found and suspicion falls on a native American who has recently returned to town with a Japanese wife. Secrets abound in the town. Can the murder be solved before the town explodes.

August 24 Tom Lake by Ann Patchett

In the spring of 2020 Lara's three daughters return home to the family orchard. As they pick cherries the daughters ask their mother for stories of her past. As she tells her stories her daughters examine their own lives and their relationship with their mother. They also reconsider everything they thought they knew.

September 28 A Council of Dolls by Mora Susa Power

The story of three Native American women from three different eras told in part through the stories of the dolls they carry.

October 26 The Last Russian Doll by Kristen Loesch

A story of secrets, revenge and redemption that follows three generations of Russian women from 1917 revolution to the last days of the Soviet Union.

November 26 The Marriage Portrait by Maggie O'Farrel

Historical fiction. Lucrezia de' Medici marries Alfonso II, duke of Ferra. She begins to think her life is in danger, is it? Historically, the answer is yes. The author brings Lucrezia to life.
